Symposium summary		scientific research collaboration in the fields of biodiversity and museum science between Kyoto University and the University of Yangon, and also on the development of a multilateral research network spanning the whole of Asia. Researchers and graduate students from Japan and Myanmar (mainly from Kyoto University and the University of Yangon) participated, together with speakers from leading East and South-East Asian universities, including institutions in Korea, China, Taiwan, Vietnam, Laos, India, Thailand, Malaysia, Indonesia, and the Philippines. The symposium's presentations and lively discussion sessions focused on the topic of research into Asian vertebrate species diversity (a field which has a long history at Kyoto University and which remains highly relevant) and the related topic of maintaining a museum science and collection network.
		A total of twenty-one presentations were delivered by researchers from ten different countries, including eleven presentations by Kyoto University researchers. In accordance with two of the keywords from Kyoto University's WINDOW Concept: "Wild and Wise," the symposium provided a platform for researchers from Japan, Myanmar, and other Asian countries to promote research collaboration beyond national and generational borders. The participants acknowledged that the "passion" of researchers is indispensable in maintaining a network for leading research collaboration in Asia.
		A large number of graduate students from several different countries, including six students from Kyoto University, also participated and made significant contributions, providing the perspective of Asia's next generation of researchers. The symposium included passionate and enthusiastic participation by not only young researchers and students, but also by an older generation of established scholars.
		The symposium served to highlight the presence and enterprise of Kyoto University within the scientific community in Asia. It underscored the university's efforts for the advancement of research collaboration and network-building in the Asian region, and its dedication to fostering the next generation of young scholars.
